DIRECTIONS FOR MAKING “THE TOWER OF BABEL” STORY PROPS

1. Cut the top and bottom of the tower patterns along the outside solid line.
2. Butt the top and bottom of the tower together. Tape together on the back
3. Cut the people out.
4. Cut out the bubbles which contain the sayings.
5. Laminate the people, bubbles and tower.
6. Place a ruler along each dotted folding line on the tower. Draw a pencil line over the dotted line. This impression will help make a neat fold. Fold all the dotted lines to the back. Also fold in the same way the line formed by the two tower pieces butted together.
7. Cut 15 to 18 brick sized pieces of sandpaper. Attach them to the tower with contact cement or double-sided tape. Distribute them randomly. They provide texture.
8. Cut the shorter narrow magnetic strip into six pieces the size of the bricks marked “A” on the tower. Attach them in the spaces marked “A”. Cut the medium magnetic strip into six pieces the size of the bricks marked “B”. Attach them in the spaces marked “B”.
9. Cut the longer narrow magnetic strip into twelve 1/2 inch pieces. Attach the pieces to the back of the people and bubbles. The pieces should be placed horizontally.

DIRECTIONS FOR TELLING “THE TOWER OF BABEL” STORY

1. Use the tower as the story is being told, or as a reinforcement afterwards.
2. Starting at the top, bend the folds back consecutively until only the bottom level of the tower shows.
3. As the story is told about the tower rising higher and higher, unfold the tower to its full height.
4. After the tower is unfolded completely, attach two people at a time. The people are placed on opposite sides facing each other. Begin at the bottom level. Place bubbles over their heads in the following order:

Bottom:	Give me some mortar.	I don't have any water.
Middle:	The wall is too tall.	I am not going to fall.
Top:	Those bricks are too thick.	I definitely am not sick.

The wall is too tall.

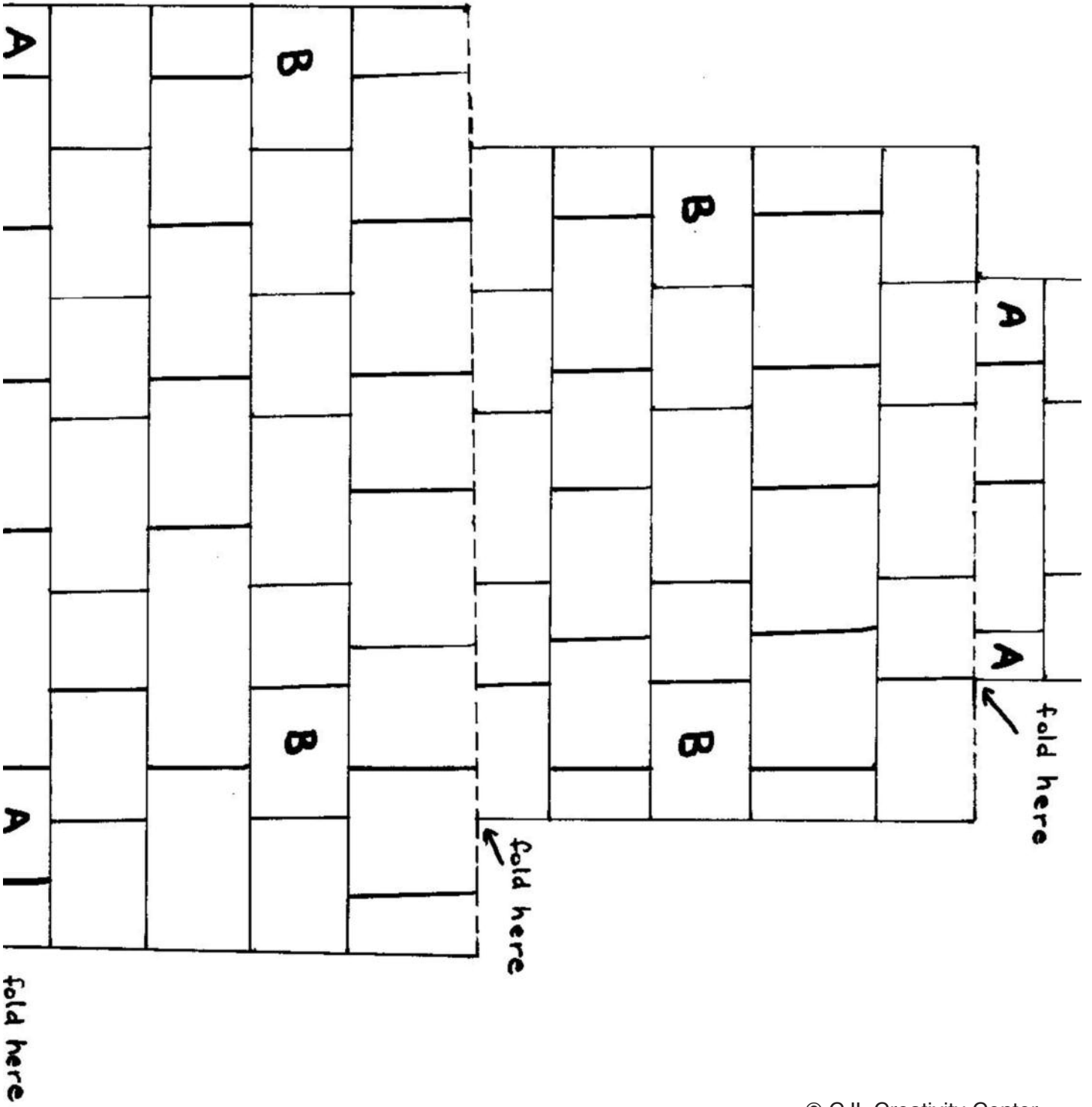

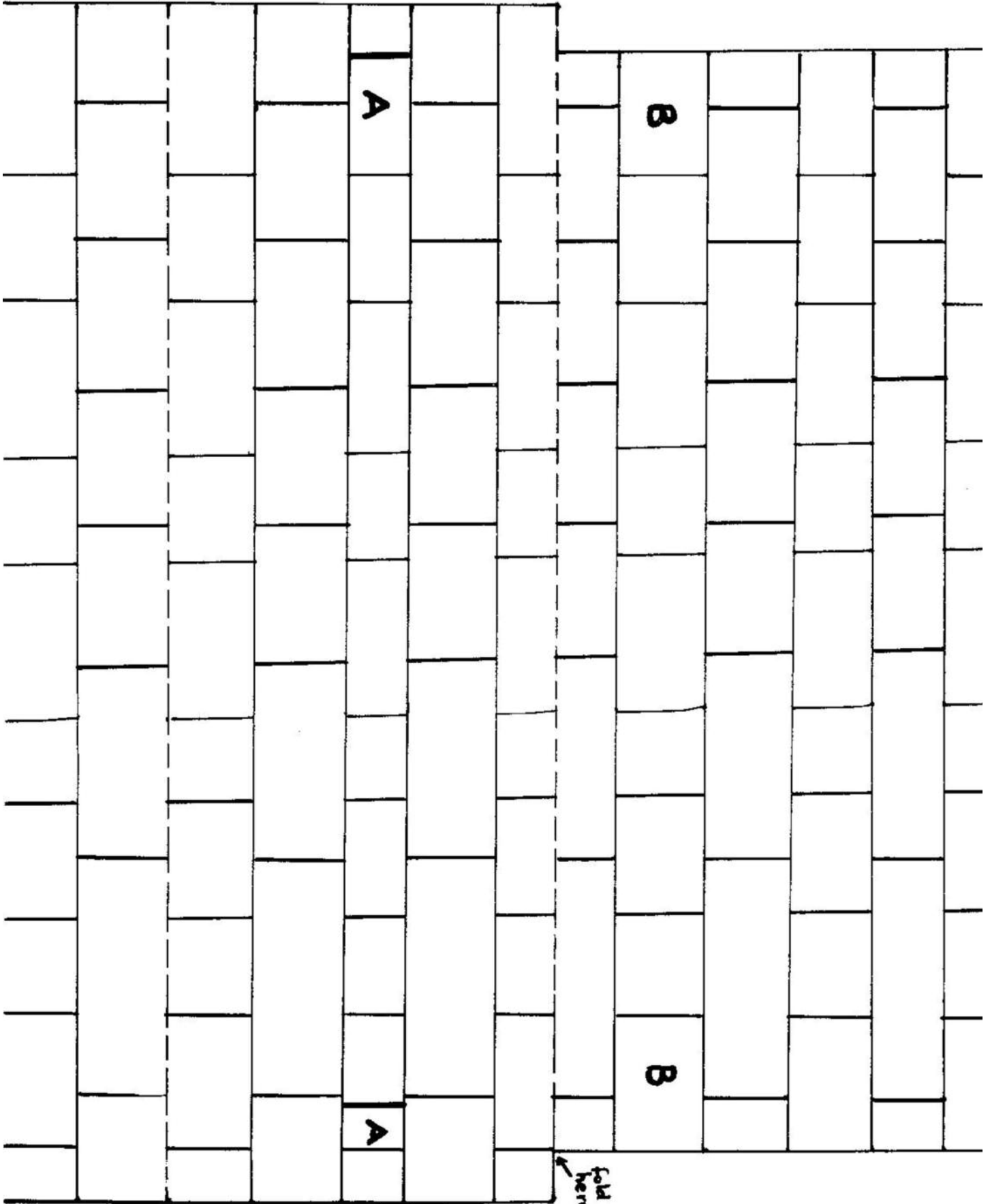
